

JULY IS REEK MONTH - PILGRIMAGE ON CROAGH PATRICK: The annual Reek Sunday Pilgrimage on Croagh Patrick will be going ahead this year in a much extended format from Thursday 1st to Saturday 31st July. GOSPEL FOR 16th SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME Mark 6:30-34

'They were like sheep without a shepherd.'



The apostles rejoined Jesus and told him all they had done and taught. Then he said to them, 'You must come away to some lonely place all by yourselves and rest for a while'; for there were so many coming and going that the apostles had no time even to eat. So they went off in a boat to a lonely place where they could be by themselves. But people saw them going, and many could guess where; and from every town they all hurried to the place on foot and reached it before them.

So as he stepped ashore he saw a large crowd; and he took pity on them because they were like sheep without a shepherd, and he set himself to teach them at some length.

GOSPEL REFLECTION

Here we see the humanity of Jesus and his disciples, they were tired. And they wanted to tell Jesus all that had happened to them on their journey. If you remember last Sunday we heard the story of Jesus sending out the apostles in pairs. But the crowds of people prevented them. They did not even have time for a meal. Jesus suggested that they should cross the lake by boat. They would then have some time to rest. To cross the lake by boat might take a long time. It might take more time than to run round to the other side. So the people arrived before Jesus and the disciples. I can only imagine how exhausted the disciples felt having rowed the boat across the lake only to realise that the crowd was there before them but Jesus, the Good Shepherd did not abandon them and he will never abandon us either. In his writings St Paul reassures us that nothing will ever come between us and the love of God.

Jesus who called himself the Good Shepherd referred to these people as sheep without a shepherd. The analogy of 'Sheep without a Shepherd' would mean something very different to those with Jesus than it would mean for us today. In first century Palestine the sheep have a relationship with their shepherd they recognised his voice and followed him rather than being driven as people who herd sheep do in Ireland today. Sheep without anyone to look after them soon wander away from the right path. These people did not have a leader to stop them wandering away from God. They needed someone to teach them the right way to live. The religious leaders were like those leaders that Ezekiel described. They were like bad shepherds who did not take care of their sheep But Jesus is the good shepherd who cares about his sheep. So Jesus had great pity for the crowd. They had stopped his plan for a rest. But he was willing to teach them.
